





The Family of Jesus

The account of Jesus' encounter with his family appears in the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke. In our translation of Mark's Gospel, Jesus explains, "Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother" (Mark 3:35). In Luke's Gospel, the translation reads, "My mother and my brothers are those who hear the word of God and act on it" (Luke 8:21). It seems rude, this famous response of Jesus to the message that his family is waiting for him. But perhaps it was simply another teachable moment about who constitutes Jesus' family. [W]e look not to what is seen but to what is unseen; for what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen is eternal.

Mark 3:20-35

[Jesus said,] "Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother." hear him—and *act* on what he says—as his brothers and sisters.

The first task is to hear. We live in a noisy world full of false prophets, and the gifts of listening and discernment must be practiced daily. When we do hear, we must act. "Sentiment without action is the ruin of the soul," said Edward Abbey.

The definition of family has expanded. Jesus started the expansion movement. With him, there are no divisions, no separation among people. We are all brothers and sisters of Jesus if we do the will of his Father, who is our Father. It becomes clear that Jesus is my brother, the victim of sex trafficking is my sister, the child dying of thirst or hunger is my child, the homeless man is my uncle, the girl ostracized because of her sexual orientation is my cousin. The list is endless. The only people who earned Jesus' scorn were the hypocrites, never the victims, the bullied, or the misunderstood. #



Learn to Look for the Invisible

Tn his letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul writes that as Christians, we should fix our attention on the invisible, because only the invisible is eternal. What we can see with our eyes and experience with our other senses is transient. All that will pass away. In our world, these words seem to make little sense. They probably made no more sense to their first hearers.

Where, then, is the invisible to be found, so that we can learn to attend consistently to it? The eternal and invisible is within us, deep inside our being. It is beyond our thoughts and beyond our emotions. These are transitory, as one can realize with a little self-observation. Paul says that Christians do not get discouraged or



downhearted, because "our inner nature is being renewed day by day." If we do not yet experience this, how can we discover it?

We can practice becoming still, physically and emotionally; allowing our thoughts to die away. As we learn to do this, we experience a profound inner life that we may never have guessed was available. This innermost life will go with us when we die. Everything else will stay behind, yoked to the body and to time. Our inner nature is the "place" where we discover love that flows to all, regardless of personalities; the "place" where joy is constant and independent of circumstances; where peace passes far beyond our understanding and simply sustains us. The inner nature is where we experience God. That is why St. Paul urges us to focus on the inward and invisible. #

From "Respect for Life and Human Dignity: Essential Principles of Catholic Social Teaching" by Fr. William J. Byron, SJ

The hope is that we can agree on one thing—that each person possesses a human life that began at the moment of conception. Reasoned argument will lead to conclusions that can be commended to all because of their consistency with the human nature shared by all, not necessarily because of their conformity with the tenets of a religion to which not all subscribe. Consider: unnecessary war, capital punishment, declining Social Security benefits, advancing medical research, rising medical costs combined with limited medical coverage, improving the quality of education, defending the rights of workers, collective bargaining, protecting the human and civil rights of minorities, assuring justice in law enforcement and taxation, and much more. These are all issues of life...and of all lives. #
